Climate Risks for Workers International Workers' Memorial Day 28 April 2024

International Workers' Memorial Day (IWMD) is the day when the international labour movement remembers those who have been killed or injured in workplace accidents and those who have died from occupational diseases.

The event started in Canada and the US in 1986 and has been supported by Usdaw since 1995. Since then it has been taken up by the TUC and is supported by the Health and Safety Executive and by the British Government.

This year the theme for IWMD chosen by the International TUC is "Climate risks for workers".

Heat is already one of the biggest health and safety concerns for our members, as exposure can have short and long term health impacts. This issue is only likely to worsen over the coming years, with global warming increasing average temperatures and causing heatwaves.

Health and Safety Reps can struggle to deal with this issue as there is no maximum workplace temperature for workplaces in the law. Usdaw supports the TUC in wanting to see a legal maximum temperature for indoor work of 30°C (27°C for those doing strenuous work).

The law currently requires employers in indoor workplaces to provide a reasonable temperature, and to act where the temperature is uncomfortably high. For outdoor workplaces there is still the general duty to protect workers from the heat by assessing the risks and introducing reasonable measures.

Health and Safety Reps can deliver improved working conditions when there is excessive heat when they:

- Organise Health and Safety Reps, using the power of the collective voice of the membership, can organise and act where they work to achieve improved working conditions around high temperatures.
- Consult Usdaw Health and Safety Reps can use their legal functions to listen to the members concerns, take temperature readings in their workplace, and consult their employer to introduce measures.
- Protect Usdaw can use its bargaining strength to make sure that workplace health and safety risk assessments for high temperatures are in place and continue to push the Government for a strengthening of the law, by introducing a maximum workplace temperature.
